# I. Introduction

This report is a compilation of votes showing how members of Congress acted on legislative measures related to consumer and investor protections, climate finance, corporate governance, and the structure and regulation of the financial system during the 118th Congress (January 3rd, 2023 to January 3rd, 2025).

The votes included in this report are on legislative measures—i.e., bills, joint resolutions, amendments—and nominations with a recorded vote and on which Americans for Financial Reform (AFR) took a position by either endorsing/opposing the proposal or the confirmation of a nominee through a public statement or a letter of support/opposition, or by communicating its position directly to members of Congress or their staff.

The votes on these measures reveal when lawmakers chose to: 1) protect workers, families, retirees, investors, and small businesses; 2) incorporate attention to climate change-related risks into financial regulation; and 3) maintain the stability of the financial system, versus when they chose to prioritize the profits and wealth of Wall Street insiders and financial services companies.

## *First Session*

During the first session of the 118th Congress, the Republican-led House of Representatives set out to repeal or undermine rules that protect the public interest regarding the financial system in a myriad of ways. The great majority of the financial services-related bills and amendments brought up for a vote were industry-friendly proposals that would weaken market transparency, corporate accountability, and protections for small ‘retail’ investors, or that would undermine the capacity, independence, and even the existence of some of the key agencies responsible for setting and enforcing financial regulations.

Most of these proposals started from the House Financial Services Committee (HFSC). During the

first year of this Congress with a Republican House majority, the HFSC advanced over two dozen bills that, taken together, would drastically expand the size of opaque, illiquid private securities markets to the detriment of public markets. Public markets require a much greater level of transparency and have stronger investor protections.

Another Republican priority to which HFSC Chairman Patrick McHenry (R-NC) devoted significant Committee time—a series of six hearings and a markup during so-called “ESG month”—was advancing legislation that would undermine regulations designed to equip investors with more information to make better investment decisions; further insulate the management of public companies from shareholder input and accountability; and hamstringing the ability of federal regulators to respond effectively to risks in the financial system.

The HFSC also passed several bills in the digital assets sector favoring a deregulatory approach to an industry rife with fraud and risky speculation. These bills would legitimize risky and predatory crypto business models, fail to adequately protect digital asset users while exposing them to more harm, threaten to undermine or gut sound financial regulations writ large, and could sow the seeds of a future financial crisis fueled by crypto.

On the Senate side, the body considered the nominations of a number of financial regulatory leaders nominated by President Biden with strong qualifications and commitments to economic and racial justice, such as Tanya F. Otsuka, who became the first Asian-American to serve as a member of the National Credit Union Administration Board.

Apart from a handful of confirmations of regulators, however, any meaningful financial regulation has stalled in the Senate because of the supermajority (60 votes) required to break filibusters on legislation.

The financial regulatory matters that did receive votes were joint resolutions to overturn certain regulatory agency rules using the Congressional Review Act (CRA), which can be moved forward by the minority party and require only a simple majority to advance.

Two notable challenges to regulations AFR supports were brought under the CRA during the first session of the 118th Congress. One to repeal a Consumer Financial Protection Bureau rule (the “CFPB rule”) designed to promote transparency in credit access and combat racial and gender discrimination in small business lending. The other to overturn a Department of Labor rule (the “DOL rule”) to remove burdensome barriers to considering environmental, social, governance factors in plan investments and when exercising shareholder rights. Both CRA challenges passed the House and Senate by narrow margins—the CRA of the CFPB rule passed with six Democrats in the House and three Democrats plus two Independents in the Senate joining all Republicans present in voting for passage, and the CRA of the DOL rule passed with one Democrat in the House and two Democrats in the Senate voting along with all Republicans present. Both CRAs were later vetoed by President Biden and subsequent votes to override the vetoes failed in the Senate (for the CFPB rule) and in the House (for the DOL rule), so ultimately neither rule was overturned by the CRA challenges.

### ***Second Session***

During the second session of the 118th Congress the Republican-led House of Representatives continued efforts to roll back financial regulations and consumer protections. This included advancing two major deregulatory legislative packages. The first, H.R.2799 (described below), relaxes the requirements for companies to become publicly traded and at the same time allows firms in private markets to raise virtually unlimited funds from retail investors, weakening protections and increasing the risk of fraud and scams that harm retirees and

everyday investors. The second, H.R.4763 (described below), was written for the benefit of the crypto industry and would limit the Securities and Exchange Commission’s (SEC) ability to effectively regulate crypto assets and would also undermine investors’ right to sue fraudulent crypto firms.

During the second session, the HFSC advanced another eighteen bills opposed by AFR because they would roll back important consumer safeguards and bank safety and soundness regulations; significantly undermine the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau’s (CFPB) ability to effectively prosecute financial companies that engage in unfair, deceptive and abusive practices; or nullify important regulatory agency rules using the Congressional Review Act (CRA).

Some of the CRAs sought to rescind climate-related rules such as the SEC climate risk disclosure rule—which is critical to equip investors with the information they need to protect themselves from climate-related financial risk—and a set of climate-related risk management principles issued jointly by the Federal Reserve, the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation, and the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency. Another CRA challenged a CFPB rule protecting credit card users from excessive late fees. While these CRAs passed in the HFSC, only one—to overturn a SEC regulatory guidance protecting everyday investors from inappropriate risks and the questionable practices found throughout crypto markets—passed the House and later the Senate. This joint resolution of disapproval was vetoed by President Biden and a subsequent vote to override the veto failed in the House, so the SEC guidance stood through the end of 2024.

Many of the bills included in this report advanced through party line votes with Democrats voting against them to protect investors, corporate accountability, and rules to protect the public interest in the stability of the financial system. A smaller number of the bills that AFR opposed because of their deregulatory nature advanced through

committees and then the House with support from some Democratic members as well as all or virtually all Republican members.

In a subset of these instances, some or many Democratic members voted for AFR-opposed proposals after having worked with their Republican counterparts to improve the bills from their most damaging versions. While those efforts limited potential harms, the final version of these bills still undermined market integrity and/or stripped investors of basic protections and of information critical for decision-making, and thus AFR continued to oppose them. Overall, it is worth noting HFSC Ranking Member Maxine Waters' (D-CA) leadership in defense of financial regulation in the public interest.

The rest of this report is divided into two sections. The first section offers a summary of each of the selected bills grouped in the following categories:

*Consumer and Housing Protections; Corporate Governance and Responsible Investing; Climate Financial Regulation; Capital Markets and Investor Protections; Financial Technology and Cryptocurrencies; Systemic Risk and Financial Stability; Multi-Issue Deregulation; and Senate Confirmations.* The summaries include a short description of the legislative measure, the latest congressional action taken in each case, and links to the official record of votes cast, the official text of the proposals, and a letter by AFR or AFR and allies discussing our support or opposition to the measure.

The second section offers summaries of the recorded roll call votes tabulated in the appendices, highlighting those members who stood out for consistently siding with Wall Street and voting to loosen the rules for the financial industry at the expense of ordinary people, small investors, market integrity, and financial stability.

## II. Bill Summaries

### 1. Consumer Protections and Housing

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Legislation added to this section would weaken the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau (CFPB) and dramatically reduce its ability to stop abuses by big banks, predatory lenders and other financial companies, or would attack specific protections for consumers or small businesses. Some bills also would reduce housing affordability, particularly for people of color and low- and middle-income people.

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- **Small Business Jobs Act. [H.R.3937](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).**

H.R.3937 includes a provision doubling-down on the Trump-era Opportunity Zones program that has brought little to no benefit to underserved communities while further enriching a handful of wealthy tech and Wall Street investors and real estate titans. Opportunity Zones created a huge incentive for investments in gentrifying areas that are likely to drive up housing costs for people of color and low- and moderate-income people living in the designated areas, exacerbating the affordable housing crisis.

*Introduced by Rep. Jason Smith (R-MO-8), H.R.3937 was approved by the House Ways and Means Committee on June 13, 2023 by a vote of 24-18.*

- **Middle Class Borrower Protection Act of 2023. [H.R.3564](#). Committee vote [no. 66](#). House floor vote [no. 289](#).**

H.R.3564 reverses the changes to single-family mortgage fees charged by Freddie Mac and Fannie Mae and set by the Federal Housing Finance Agency (FHFA). The bill would rescind the

FHFA's more equitable pricing framework and instead require the FHFA to increase fees for many first-time home buyers and those who do not have a 20 percent down payment. It would also require the FHFA to lower fees for housing investors and vacation homeowners while making homeownership more difficult for middle-class Americans.

*Introduced by Rep. Warren Davidson (R-OH-8), H.R.3564 was approved by the HFSC on May 24, 2023 by a vote of 26-22. The bill was passed in the House of Representatives on June 23, 2023 by a vote of 230-189.*

- **Data Privacy Act of 2023. [H.R.1165](#). Committee vote [no. 30](#).**

This bill would hollow out financial data privacy protections for consumers, exposing them to more risk from data security breaches and misuse of their personal financial information.

H.R.1165 fails to offer new or meaningful data privacy protections at the federal level and undermines existing safeguards in several ways. The bill preempts or overrides stronger state laws that regulate the collection or

disclosure of personal information by financial institutions, and could nullify similar state laws that apply to a much wider array of financial institutions and types of financial data, from auto dealers to medical debt to credit bureaus. The bill also fails to address the need for a private right of action or remedy for consumers harmed when financial institutions violate their privacy rights.

*Introduced by Rep. Patrick McHenry, (R-NC-10), H.R.1165 was approved by the HFSC on February 28, 2023 by a vote of 26-21.*

- **Disapproving the rule submitted by the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau relating to "Small Business Lending Under the Equal Credit Opportunity Act (Regulation B)."** [H.J.Res.66](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).
- **A joint resolution providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Bureau of Consumer Financial Protection relating to "Small Business Lending Under the Equal Credit Opportunity Act (Regulation B)".** [S.J.Res.32](#). House floor vote [no. 690](#). Senate floor votes [no. 260](#) and [no. 5](#) (on overriding the veto).

These joint resolutions (H.J. Res.66 and S.J.Res.32) nullify the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau's (CFPB) Regulation B, a rule mandated by the Dodd-Frank Act to require financial institutions to collect and report

information on small businesses lending to the CFPB, including demographic data on the ownership of those businesses. Many small businesses, particularly minority- and women-owned businesses, struggle to access capital or pay steeper interest rates for loans needed to grow and prosper. Regulation B data would help combat discrimination in lending and increase transparency and fairness in access to credit.

*H.J.Res.66 was introduced by Rep. Roger Williams (R-TX-25) and approved by the HFSC on July 27, 2023 by a vote of 29-21.*

*S.J.Res.32 was introduced by Sen. John Kennedy (R-LA) and approved by the Senate on October 18, 2023 by a vote of 53-44. It passed the House on December 1, 2023 by a vote of 221-202. S.J.Res.32 was sent to the President and vetoed on December 19, 2023. The Senate failed to override the veto on January 10, 2024 by a vote of 54-45.<sup>1</sup>*

- **CFPB Transparency and Accountability Reform Act.** [H.R.2798](#). Committee vote [no. 57](#).

This bill would gut the Consumer Financial Protection Bureau's (CFPB) power by altering its funding, structure, and rulemaking procedures. It would dramatically undermine the CFPB's ability to protect consumers, and as a result enable Wall Street, big banks and other financial firms to continue

predatory practices that take tens of billions of dollars from hardworking people each year. Before the CFPB, the lack of robust consumer financial protections helped trigger the 2008 financial crisis, devastating the U.S. and global economies.

*Introduced by Rep. Andy Barr (R-KY-6), H.R.2798 was approved by the HFSC on April 26, 2023 by a vote of 26-23.*

- **Clarity in Lending Act. [H.R.8338](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).**

This legislative package consists of four bills that would significantly undermine the CFPB's ability to effectively prosecute financial companies that engage in unfair, deceptive and abusive practices, including by taking away its authority to consider discrimination on the basis of race, gender, or other characteristics as an abusive practice, and exempting lenders from liability for violating fair lending and other long-standing consumer financial protection laws and policies.

*Introduced by Rep. Young Kim (R-CA-40), H.R.8338 was approved by the HFSC on May 16, 2024 by a vote of 27-22.*

- **Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Bureau of Consumer Financial Protection relating to "Credit Card Penalty Fees (Regulation Z)". [H.J.Res.122](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).**

This joint resolution would overturn a CFPB rule capping credit card late fees at \$8, down from the \$32 and more typical today. The CFPB late fees rule protects consumers from predatory back-end junk fees and would return \$10 billion back to consumers every year. Overturning the rule would expose consumers to excessive and unjustified financial burdens imposed by credit card giants.

*Introduced by Rep. Andy Barr (KY-6), H.J.Res 122 was approved by the HFSC on April 17, 2024 by a vote of 28-22.*

- **Earned Wage Access Consumer Protection Act. [H.R.7428](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).**

Earned wage advances are loans made to workers ahead of payday that are repaid on payday. Predatory lenders, often fintech firms, regularly target Black, Latine, and immigrant communities with these loans, and charge inflated fees (of up to 300 percent APR, like a traditional payday loan) that trap borrowers in endless cycles of debt. This bill would allow these lenders to escape fair lending and transparency requirements, making it more difficult for consumers to understand and manage the high costs of these products.

*Introduced by Rep. Bryan Steil (R-WI-1), H.R.7428 was approved by the HFSC on April 17, 2024 by a vote of 28-22.*

- **Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5,**

**United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Department of Labor relating to "Retirement Security Rule: Definition of an Investment Advice Fiduciary". [H.J.Res.142](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).**

This CRA challenge would overturn a Department of Labor (DOL) rule to protect the retirement savings of millions of retirees. The DOL rule requires financial professionals who provide retirement investment advice to put the best interests of their clients ahead of their own financial gain (through commissions, fees or perks).

*Introduced by Rep. Rick W. Allen (R-GA-12), H.J.Res.142 was approved by the House Committee on Education and*

*the Workforce on July 10, 2024 by a vote of 23-18.*

- **Financial Services Innovation Act of 2024. [H.R.7440](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).**

This bill would create regulatory “sandboxes” or safe harbors for new, untested financial products or services, like new types of mortgages or loan products, and exempt them from existing consumer protection laws and regulations. This bill would curtail regulatory oversight to enforce the law and protect consumers and instead allow risky and unproven financial products into the marketplace without normal safeguards.

*Introduced by Rep. Patrick T. McHenry (R-NC-10), H.R.7440 was approved by the HFSC on April 17, 2024 by a vote of 28-22.*

## 2. Corporate Governance and Responsible Investing

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The bills in this section would make it more difficult for shareholders to access information and have their voices heard on key company actions, such as responses to climate risks, workplace safety issues, and practices contributing to racial inequality. By creating obstacles for investors such as workers' pension funds and retirees, these bills would hinder their ability to align investments with their own and their communities' long-term interests. Additionally, some votes on this section were on bills that would force financial actors to ignore a range of financial risks, undermining workers' retirement security and the integrity of our financial system while also weakening tools of corporate accountability.

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- **Protecting Americans' Retirement Savings from Politics Act.** [H.R.4767](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

H.R.4767 would increase the power of corporate executives by making it more difficult for shareholders like workers' pension funds to get their voices heard on labor rights, racial justice, the energy transition, and other important issues.

*Introduced by Rep. Bryan Steil (R-WI-1), H.R.4767 was approved by the HFSC on July 27, 2023 by a vote of 29-21.*

- **Businesses Over Activists Act.** [H.R.4655](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

This bill would shut off an important mechanism shareholders like workers' pension funds use to get their voices heard on labor rights, racial justice, the energy transition, and other important issues. This mechanism is the shareholder proposal process, whereby shareholders can ask other shareholders to vote on a proposal asking a corporation to take action on a particular issue. Examples include setting credible energy transition plans, conducting racial equity audits, and setting living wage standards.

*Introduced by Rep. Ralph Norman (R-SC-5), H.R.4655 was approved by the HFSC on July 27, 2023 by a vote of 29-21.*

- **Protecting Americans' Investments from Woke Policies Act.** [H.R.5339](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#). House floor vote [no. 427](#).

This bill would put workers' retirement security at risk by forcing retirement account managers who manage workers' savings to ignore certain financial risks, like climate-related issues; send confusing and misleading information to investors; and stop efforts to increase diversity among their ranks. The bill would also make it more difficult for workers' money to be invested for their own benefit in ways beyond investment returns, like promoting union jobs and investing in the economy of the geographic region where the plan's beneficiaries live and work.

*Introduced by Rep. Rick W. Allen (R-GA-12)—originally titled the "Roll Back ESG To Increase Retirement Earnings (RETIRE) Act," H.R.5339 was approved by the House Committee on Education and the Workforce on September 14, 2023 by a vote of 23-19. It eventually became a legislative package including four bills*

*previously advanced by the HFSC, received a new title, and passed the House of Representatives on September 18, 2024 by a vote of 217-206.*

- **Retirement Proxy Protection Act.** [H.R.5337](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

H.R.5337 would enhance the power of public companies' corporate directors and executives while undermining worker shareholders power and their say in the operations of the companies in which they are invested.

*Introduced by Rep. Erin Houchin (R-IN-9), H.R.5337 was approved by the House Committee on Education and the Workforce on September 14, 2023 by a vote of 23-19.*

- **No Discrimination in My Benefits Act.** [H.R.5338](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

This bill is one of many attempts to stymie initiatives to ameliorate racial inequalities by falsely equating the consideration of race to immoral (and sometimes illegal) discrimination.

*Introduced by Rep. Bob Good (R-VA-5), H.R.5338 was approved by the House Committee on Education and the Workforce on September 14, 2023 by a vote of 23-19.*

- **Providing Complete Information to Retirement Investors Act.** [H.R.5340](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

H.R.5340 would require a notice with misleading information to be sent to retirement plan participants who choose an investment fund not chosen by a fiduciary. This is meant to disincentivize retirement savers from choosing funds with more of a focus on environmental and social issues.

*Introduced by Rep. Jim Banks (R-IN-3), H.R.5340 was approved by the House Committee on Education and the Workforce on September 14, 2023 by a vote of 23-19.*

### 3. Climate Financial Regulation

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The bills in this section would stand in the way of actions to respond to climate financial risks and to protect people from the harms of climate change, including by rolling back climate risk-related rules by regulatory agencies using the Congressional Review Act.

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- **Lower Energy Costs Act. [H.R.1](#). House floor vote [no. 182](#).**

H.R.1 would delay climate action and harm vulnerable communities by repealing the Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, which provides funding to non-profit entities to address gaps in green finance accessibility and state/local/tribal governments for zero-emission technologies in low-income and disadvantaged communities. It would also weaken environmental protections and increase reliance on fossil fuels, slowing the transition to clean energy.

*Introduced by Rep. Steve Scalise (R-LA-1), H.R.1 was passed by the House of Representatives on March 30, 2023 by a vote of 225-204.*

- **Making appropriations for financial services and general government for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024, and for other purposes. [H.R.4664](#). [Amendment 671](#). House floor vote [no. 630](#).**

Amendment 671 would prohibit the use of government funds for President Biden's executive orders on climate change. This amendment would undermine efforts to tackle climate change and related issues such as public health, environmental justice, climate-related risks to the financial system,

manufacturing, or supply chain, and other key matters.

*Introduced by Rep. Andy Barr (R-KY-6), Amendment 671 of H.R.4664 was passed by the House of Representatives on November 8, 2023 by a vote of 219-210.*

- **Making appropriations for financial services and general government for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024, and for other purposes. [H.R.4664](#). [Amendment 722](#). House floor vote [no. 642](#).**

This amendment blocks government funds for creating or implementing a rule requiring major federal contractors to disclose greenhouse emissions and climate risk strategies. These disclosures are critical to track progress toward climate goals and stamp out greenwashing, protect the federal government from climate related financial risks, and promote efficient government spending.

*Introduced by Rep. Claudia Tenney (R-NY-24), Amendment 722 of H.R.4664 was passed by the House of Representatives on November 9, 2023 by a vote of 220-202.*

- **Department of Defense Appropriations Act, 2025. [H.R.8774](#).**

**[H.Amdt.1076](#). House floor vote **[no. 326](#)**.**

In another baseless attack on science-based decision making, this spending reduction amendment would cut the climate change research capability of the Department of Defense, hamstringing its efforts to understand, be prepared for, and respond to this growing national security threat. This amendment would put peoples' health and well-being at risk, and directly compromise national security.

*Introduced by Rep. Barry Moore (R-AL-2), H.Amdt.1076 to H.R.8774 was passed by the House of Representatives on June 27, 2024 by a vote of 210-201.*

- **Department of the Interior, Environment, and Related Agencies Appropriations Act, 2025. [H.R.8998](#). [H.Amdt.1138](#). House floor vote **[no. 384](#)**.**

This amendment would block funding for the Inflation Reduction Act's Greenhouse Gas Reduction Fund, a first-of-its-kind program with \$27 billion in funding to address the climate crisis. Funding recipients were picked to combat climate change, advance environmental justice, and accelerate the transition to an equitable energy future while also creating jobs and lowering energy costs for families. This amendment would prohibit the Environmental Protection Agency from ensuring transparent and effective administration, implementation, or enforcement of the grants.

*Introduced by Rep. Lauren Boebert, (R-CO-3), H.Amdt.1138 to H.R.8998 was rejected by the House of Representatives on July 23, 2024 by a vote of 208-211.*

- **Insurance Data Protection Act. [H.R.5535](#). Committee vote **[no. N/A](#)**.**

After years of climate-driven disasters, property insurers are raising rates and exiting markets, worsening housing affordability. The Federal Insurance Office needs to collect data to assess the depth, breadth, and speed of the crisis and coordinate with other regulators to protect the financial system and consumers. This bill would make oversight nearly impossible by stripping the FIO of its subpoena power, blocking data collection by the Office of Financial Research, and prohibiting data sharing with other regulators.

*Introduced by Rep. Scott Fitzgerald (R-WI-5), H.R.5535 was approved by the HFSC on April 17, 2024 by a vote of 28-22.*

- **Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Securities and Exchange Commission relating to "The Enhancement and Standardization of Climate-Related Disclosures for Investors". [H.J.Res.127](#). Committee vote **[no. N/A](#)**.**

This joint resolution of disapproval would nullify a SEC climate risk disclosure rule critical for investors to have the information they need to

protect themselves from climate-related financial risk and accurately value the securities of public companies. The SEC was highly responsive to concerns raised by opponents of the proposal and finalized a modest disclosure rule that, while not requiring the full scope of information needed by investors, will provide an important baseline of disclosures.

- **Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System relating to "Principles for Climate-Related Financial Risk Management for Large Financial Institutions".** [H.J.Res.125.](#) Committee vote [no. N/A.](#)
- **Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation relating to "Principles for Climate-Related Financial Risk Management for**

## **Large Financial Institutions".**

These three resolutions of disapproval would overturn climate risk management principles issued by the Federal Reserve, the Office of the Comptroller of the Currency, and the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation. While non-binding, these guidelines help large banks assess climate-related risks to credit, markets, liquidity, and operations. The climate risk principles do not direct, encourage, or discourage any specific lending or financial activities. As climate-related financial risks grow, these principles become more important for maintaining financial stability.

## 4. Capital Markets and Investor Protections

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This section covers deregulatory measures to dramatically expand the pool of individual investors Wall Street can sell directly to through the opaque and high-risk private securities markets; to limit the ability of investors to access the information needed to meaningfully evaluate private market offerings; or to allow for riskier activities by investment firms. These bills continue a trend of expanding private markets at the expense of the better-regulated public markets, potentially siphoning trillions of dollars from the latter into the former. The effect of these bills would be to inappropriately expose investors—including individual investors with limited funds—to excessive financial risks and greater danger of fraud, and to limit federal regulators’ ability to police wrongdoing, all to the benefit of Wall Street insiders.

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- **To amend the Investment Advisers Act of 1940 to codify certain Securities and Exchange Commission no-action letters that exclude brokers and dealers compensated for certain research services from the definition of investment adviser, and for other purposes. [H.R.2622](#). Committee vote [no. 72](#).**

This bill would make permanent a temporary policy allowing certain broker-dealers to avoid registering with the Securities and Exchange Commission (SEC) as investment advisers, potentially leading to reduced price transparency and conflicts of interest that can lead to biased advice to the detriment of investors.

*Introduced by Rep. Pete Sessions (R-TX-17), H.R.2622 was approved by the HFSC on April 26, 2023 by a vote of 45-2, and passed in the House of Representatives by voice vote on July 11, 2023.*

- **Increasing Investor Opportunities Act. [H.R.2627](#). Committee vote [no. 68](#).**

This bill would override long-standing SEC policies prohibiting closed-end funds from investing more than 15 percent of their net assets in the private markets, where there is far less transparency and fewer investor protections. The bill would benefit private market insiders by giving them more access to individuals’ investment and retirement funds.

*Introduced by Rep. Ann Wagner (R-MO-2), H.R.2627 was approved by the HFSC on May 24, 2023 by a vote of 37-11. (The provisions in H.R. 2627 were included in H.R.2799, the “Expanding Access to Capital Act of 2023,” which passed the House on March 8, 2024 by a vote of 212–205.)*

- **Equal Opportunity for All Investors Act of 2023. [H.R.2797](#). Committee vote [no. 38](#). House floor vote [no. 244](#).**

This bill would expand the definition of “accredited investor” to include individuals who qualify by passing an exam designed by the SEC and administered by the Financial Industry Regulatory Authority (FINRA). The bill

fails to consider that, in addition to financial sophistication, ‘accredited investors’ also must have the wealth necessary to sustain the potential losses associated with investing in risky and illiquid private offerings.

*Introduced by Rep. Mike Flood (R-NE-1), H.R.2797 was approved by the HFSC on April 26, 2023 by a vote of 42-1. It passed the House of Representatives on May 31, 2023 by a vote of 383-18.*

- **A bill to amend the Securities Exchange Act of 1934 to specify certain registration statement contents for emerging growth companies, to permit issuers to file draft registration statements with the Securities and Exchange Commission for confidential review, and for other purposes. [H.R.2610](#). Committee vote [no. 40](#).**

This bill would reduce the financial information emerging growth companies are required to disclose when they go public or spin off pieces of their business into new companies. The bill would also extend confidential filing privileges to all registrants, depriving investors of the ability to see what SEC staff may have flagged as potential issues with a public offering.

*Introduced by Rep. Patrick T. McHenry (R-NC-10), H.R.2610 was approved by the HFSC on April 26, 2023 by a vote of 42-0, and passed the House of Representatives on June 5, 2023 by voice vote.*

- **Accredited Investor Definition Review Act. [H.R.1579](#). Committee vote [no. 35](#).**

This bill would require the SEC to initiate a review of the list of certifications, designations, and credentials for individuals to qualify as ‘accredited investors.’ It would put the SEC on a path to increasing the numbers of accredited investors who can access private markets while failing to address the fundamental problems with investing in private markets: investors must have the wealth necessary to sustain the potential losses associated with investing in opaque, risky, illiquid private offerings.

*Introduced by Rep. Bill Huizenga (R-MI-4), H.R.1579 was approved by the HFSC on April 26, 2023 by a vote of 41-2. It passed the House of Representatives on June 5, 2023 by voice vote.*

- **To amend the Federal securities laws to specify the periods for which financial statements are required to be provided by an emerging growth company, and for other purposes. [H.R.2608](#). Committee vote [no. 41](#).**

This bill would prevent the SEC and investors from obtaining important financial statements from the combined emerging growth company’s early years, with little justification. Because emerging growth companies have a high failure rate—similar to other startups—investors need more information for investments in these types of companies.

*Introduced by Rep. Patrick T. McHenry (R-NC-10), H.R.2608 was approved by the HFSC on April 26, 2023 by a vote of 41-0. It passed the House of Representatives on June 5, 2023 by voice vote.*

- **Retirement Fairness for Charities and Educational Institutions Act of 2023.** [H.R.3063](#). Committee vote [no. 74](#).

This bill would jeopardize the retirement security of public school teachers by removing existing safeguards for 403(b) retirement plan participants. A 403(b) plan is a retirement plan offered by public schools and certain charities. The bill would expose these plans to certain risky unregistered securities that are not regulated by the SEC and are sold by (unregistered) financial professionals who are under no obligation to ensure that investments are in the best interest of retirement savers.

*Introduced by Rep. Frank D. Lucas (R-OK-3), H.R.3063 was approved by the HFSC on May 24, 2023 by a vote of 35-12.*

- **Helping Angels Lead Our Startups (HALOS) Act.** [H.R.1553](#). Committee vote [no. 70](#)

H.R.1553 would permit issuers of unregistered securities to be exempted from safeguards put in place to prevent fraud and abuse of ordinary investors, as long as solicitations were made at an “event” sponsored by any of a wide range of non-profit or educational organizations and trade associations. This exemption would invite efforts to game the rules, and likely lead to losses for investors who are not in a position to

take the significant risks associated with purchases of unregistered securities.

*Introduced by Rep. Michael Lawler (R-NY-17), H.R.1553 was approved by the HFSC on May 24, 2023 by a vote of 35-12.*

- **Expanding Access to Capital Act of 2023.** [H.R.2799](#). Committee vote [no. 50](#). House floor vote [no. 78](#).

H.R.2799 was a package of deregulatory provisions for both public and private markets. This legislation would lower the bar for companies to become and remain public and would also allow companies in private markets to raise virtually unlimited funds—including from retail investors—with the lowest possible degree of disclosure, compliance, and accountability. This would primarily benefit industry insiders—such as securities issuers and brokers—while increasing risks for everyday retail investors, including those saving for retirement.

*Introduced by Rep. Patrick T. McHenry (R-NC-10), H.R.2799 was approved by the HFSC on April 26, 2023 by a vote of 28-21. It passed the House of Representatives on March 8, 2024 by a vote of 212-205.*

- **Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Department of Labor relating to “Prudence and Loyalty in Selecting Plan Investments and Exercising Shareholder Rights.”** [H.J.Res.30](#). House floor votes [no.124](#)

and [no. 149](#) (on overriding the veto).  
Senate vote [no. 35](#).

This disapproval effort is backed by powerful corporate interests attempting to roll back progress made on climate change, workers' rights, racial equity, and other issues. H.J.Res.30 would overturn a Department of Labor rule that removes costly and impractical record-keeping burdens on fiduciaries; allows consideration of collateral benefits; increases workers' investment choices within the existing retirement plan protections; and removes unnecessary, expensive barriers to the exercise of shareholder rights.

*Introduced by Rep. Andy Barr (R-KY-6), H.J.Res.30 was passed in the House of Representatives on February 28, 2023 by a vote of 216-204. It passed the Senate on March 1, 2023 by a vote of 50-46. The resolution was sent to the President and vetoed on March 20, 2023. The House of Representatives failed to override the veto on March 23, 2023 by a vote of 219-200.<sup>2</sup>*

- **Making appropriations for financial services and general government for the fiscal year ending September 30, 2024, and for other purposes.**  
[H.R.4664, Amendment 675.](#) House floor vote [no. 632](#).

This amendment would have reduced the salary of Securities and Exchange Commission Chairman Gary Gensler to \$1. It attacks a government official

carrying out the SEC's investor protection and market integrity mandate.

*Introduced by Rep. Tim Burchett (R-TN-2), Amendment 675 of H.R.4664 failed to pass in the House of Representatives on November 8, 2023 by a vote of 175-252.*

- **Prioritizing Economic Growth Over Woke Policies Act.** [H.R.4790.](#) Committee vote [no. N/A.](#) House floor vote [no. 435](#).

This bill would undermine regulations that give investors more information to make better investment decisions; would let corporations have more power to decide what information they disclose and what they hide from investors, including information on climate and worker issues; and would cripple federal banking regulators' ability to respond to risks to both individual financial institutions and the financial system as a whole.

*Introduced by Rep. Bill Huizenga (R-MI-4)—originally titled the “Guiding Uniform and Responsible Disclosure Requirements and Information Limits (GUARDRAIL) Act,” H.R.4790 was approved by the HFSC on July 27, 2023 by a vote of 29-21. It eventually became a legislative package including four bills previously advanced by the HFSC, received a new title, and passed the House of Representatives on September 19, 2024 by a vote of 215-203.*

- **SEC Reform and Restructuring Act.**  
[H.R.8339](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

This bill would prevent effective SEC regulation by imposing dozens of additional legal and procedural obstacles before the introduction of new rules.

These hurdles would give powerful and well-resourced industry groups more opportunities to challenge regulations in court, further weakening the agency's ability to carry out its investor protection mission. The bill would also reduce oversight of audit firms by folding the Public Company Accounting Oversight Board (PCAOB) into the SEC's Office of Public Accounting Oversight, limiting its effectiveness.

*Introduced by Rep. Ann Wagner (R-MO-2), H.R.8339 was approved by the HFSC on May 16, 2024 by a vote of 27-22.*

- **Protecting Investors' Personally Identifiable Information Act.**  
[H.R.4551](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

This bill would block the SEC from requiring stock exchanges or securities associations and their members to provide a market participant's personally identifiable information to satisfy the reporting requirements of the Consolidated Audit Trail (CAT). The CAT is the SEC's primary mechanism for surveillance of market manipulation and other unlawful trading activities. By

restricting access to this data, this bill would make it much harder for the SEC to oversee financial markets, investigate market manipulations, and enforce trading rules.

*Introduced by Rep. Barry Loudermilk, (R-GA-11), H.R.4551 was approved by the HFSC on May 16, 2024 by a vote of 27-22.*

- **Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Securities and Exchange Commission relating to "Cybersecurity Risk Management, Strategy, Governance, and Incident Disclosure".** [H.J.Res.100](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

This joint resolution of disapproval would overturn the recent SEC "Cyber Rule," which requires public companies to disclose their policies and procedures around cybersecurity risks and to disclose cyber incidents to investors within four days. This information is crucial for investors and helps protect broader security and market stability.

## 5. Financial Technology and Cryptocurrencies

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Legislation advanced in the digital assets and financial technology sectors favored a deregulatory approach to an industry rife with fraud and risky speculation. The bills included in this section would legitimize risky and predatory crypto business models, fail to adequately protect digital asset users while exposing them to more harm, threaten to undermine or gut sound financial regulations writ large, and could sow the seeds of a future financial crisis fueled by crypto.

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- **CBDC Anti-Surveillance State Act.** [H.R.5403](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

This bill bars the Federal Reserve from providing any service or product, including accounts and so-called central bank digital currencies, directly to individuals. It would also restrict the Federal Reserve and other agencies from pursuing public banking-style services such as Fed Accounts, or other models of non-blockchain-based digital currencies that offer privacy protections and potential for increasing financial inclusion. The main beneficiaries of this bill would be cryptocurrency issuers whose products pose myriad risks to consumers, investors, and the financial system as a whole.

AFR communicated its opposition to this bill to Congressional offices.

*Introduced by Rep. Tom Emmer (R-MN-6), H.R.5403 was approved by the HFSC on September 20, 2023 by a vote of 27-20.*

- **Financial Innovation and Technology for the 21st Century Act.** [H.R.4763](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#). House floor vote [no. 226](#).

This bill, largely written by and for the crypto industry, claims to protect consumers but actually weakens regulations. It undermines the SEC's ability to effectively regulate crypto assets

and actors that should fall under securities law and could undermine broader securities regulation and investor protections beyond crypto. The bill also reduces state regulators' authority over crypto markets and fails to safeguard investors' rights to take legal action against crypto firms.

*Introduced by Rep. Glenn Thompson (R-PA-15), H.R.4763 was approved by the HFSC on July 26, 2023 by a vote of 35-15. It passed the House of Representatives on May 22, 2024 by a vote of 279-136.*

- **Clarity for Payment Stablecoins Act of 2023.** [H.R.4766](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

This bill would allow issuers of 'stablecoins'—which are digital assets that an issuer must redeem for a fixed monetary value—to act like banks but not be subject to comparably rigorous banking regulations, putting customers and the financial system at risk should these famously unstable coins lose their 'peg' and collapse. In particular, by allowing states to approve stablecoin issuers with limited federal oversight, the bill sets up a race to the bottom where unscrupulous issuers may seek out the most lax state approval process.

- **Blockchain Regulatory Certainty Act.** [H.R.1747](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

H.R.1747 would endanger the public by exempting some blockchain developers and servicers from financial reporting and licensing rules. It would let firms profit from risky crypto products prone to fraud, theft, and financial collapse while limiting regulatory accountability.

*Introduced by Rep. Tom Emmer (R-MN-6), H.R.1747 was approved by the HFSC on July 26, 2023 by a vote of 29-21.*

- **Keep Your Coins Act of 2023.** [H.R.4841](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).

This bill would make it easier for bad actors who use self-hosted “wallets” to evade oversight and accountability. For example, the bill would make it more difficult for regulators to enforce laws that protect victims of fraudulent transactions or scams that involve self-hosted crypto wallets. Large non-bank payment platforms such as Venmo or PayPal could also use this exception to avoid compliance with consumer protection laws.

*HFSC on July 27, 2023 by a vote of 29-21.*

- **Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Securities and Exchange Commission relating to “Staff Accounting Bulletin No. 121”.** [H.J.Res.109](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#). House floor votes [no. 189](#) (on passage) and [no. 355](#) (on overriding the President’s veto). Senate vote [no. 169](#).

This resolution aims to overturn the SEC’s guidance on how companies should account for safeguarding crypto assets. Removing this rule would expose investors to greater risks from poor accounting and custody practices in crypto markets. It could also weaken the SEC’s ability to provide guidance on accounting issues in other financial markets, further harming investors..

*Introduced by Rep. Mike Flood (R-NE-1), H.J.Res.109 was approved by the HFSC on February 29, 2024 by a vote of 31-19. It passed in the House of Representatives on May 8, 2024 by a vote of 228-182. It passed the Senate on May 16, 2024 by a vote of 60-38. The joint resolution was sent to the President and vetoed on May 31, 2024. The House of Representatives failed to override the veto on July 11, 2024 by a vote of 228-184.<sup>3</sup>*

## 6. Systemic Risk and Financial Stability

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Measures in this section aim to weaken financial stability safeguards by rolling back Dodd-Frank Act rules and undermining the authority and independence of regulators like the Financial Stability Oversight Council (FSOC). These bills would make it significantly harder for regulators to monitor and address risks that threaten financial system stability, including by overturning FSOC's guidance to 'designate' systematically important nonbank financial companies for enhanced oversight—a key tool for preventing financial crises. Additionally, some bills would weaken bank safety regulations. Americans for Financial Reform supported one bill (H.R.4116) included below because it would establish important reporting and transparency procedures for regulators when winding up a failed insured depository institution.

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- **American Financial Institution Regulator Sovereignty and Transparency Act. [H.R.4823](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).**

H.R.4823 would restrict agencies' regulatory authority, inhibit engagement with non-governmental international organizations, and eliminate the position of Vice Chair for Supervision of the Board of Governors of the Federal Reserve System, a position created to improve financial regulation and protect financial stability after the 2008 financial crisis.

*Introduced by Rep. Barry Loudermilk (R-GA-11), H.R.4823 was approved by the HFSC on July 27, 2023 by a vote of 29-21.*

- **Increasing Financial Regulatory Accountability and Transparency Act. [H.R.3556](#). Committee vote [no. 65](#).**

This bill would substantially undermine oversight of very large nonbank financial companies, which are a growing part of the financial system, making it harder to hold them

accountable and to prevent financial crises. H.R.3556 would make FSOC's authority to designate systemically important financial companies for enhanced supervision subject to Congressional approval, politicizing and hampering the body's efforts to prevent dangerous risks to the financial system. This proposal would vastly expand the ability of a firm seeking to evade regulation to obstruct a 'systemically important' designation by lobbying Congress to rescind it.

- **Bank Resilience and Regulatory Improvement Act. [H.R.8337](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).**

This bill is a package of six previous proposals to roll back key consumer protections and safety and soundness regulations that maintain stability and promote fair competition in banking. One provision alone would remove nearly 100 banks from CFPB oversight. It also raises regulatory thresholds and

exemptions, making it easier for large banks to avoid strict oversight, take on more debt, and engage in risky activities. Additionally, it weakens the review process for bank mergers, accelerating consolidation and reducing competition in the banking industry.

- **Promoting Access to Capital in Underbanked Communities Act of 2023. [H.R.758](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).**

This bill increases safety and soundness risks by allowing new banks to hold less capital and take on more risk than established banks. Since many new banks already struggle or fail in their early years without strong capital requirements, this change would make the banking system even more vulnerable.

*Introduced by Rep. Andy Barr (R-KY-6), H.R.8337 was approved by the HFSC on May 16, 2024 by a vote of 24-22.*

- **Providing for congressional disapproval under chapter 8 of title 5, United States Code, of the rule submitted by the Financial Stability Oversight Council related to "Guidance on Nonbank Financial Company Determinations". [H.J.Res.120](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).**

This joint resolution of disapproval would weaken the Financial Stability Oversight Council (FSOC) by blocking its ability to monitor and regulate

systemic financial risks, as required by law. It would give the largest and riskiest financial firms more freedom to take on excessive risk, increasing the chances and severity of financial crises and endangering the public, especially Black and Latine families that bear the economic impact of financial crises. for its ability to assess systemic risk, and where necessary, establish oversight of firms that could destabilize the economy and lead to another crisis.

- **Systemic Risk Authority Transparency Act. [H.R.4116](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).**

This bill would require more transparency in handling failed banks by mandating reports on the use of systemic risk authority. It builds on the rapid reporting done after the 2023 bank failures and would ensure disclosures on executive compensation, regulatory failures, and mismanagement that contributed to a bank's collapse. These measures aim to apply lessons from the failures of Silicon Valley Bank, Signature Bank, and First Republic Bank to improve oversight and accountability.

## 7. Multi-Issue Deregulation

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The bills included in this section undermine federal regulatory authority to stand up for the public interest and open additional avenues for corporations to lobby and appeal to business-friendly courts.

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- **Separation of Powers Restoration Act (SOPRA). [H.R.288](#). House floor vote [no. 271](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).<sup>4</sup>**

H.R.288 would provide the judiciary a stronger role in policymaking, moving away from deference to agency interpretations of statute. This bill would create an environment of regulatory uncertainty and unpredictable policy changes, it would interfere with agencies' exercise of regulatory powers, and it would increase corporate control over policy making.

*Introduced by Rep. Scott Fitzgerald (R-WI-5), H.R.288 was approved by the House Judiciary Committee on May 10, 2023 by a vote of 15-5. The bill was passed by the House of Representatives on June 15, 2023 by a vote of 220-211.*

- **REINS Act of 2023. [H.R.277](#). House floor vote [no. 265](#). Committee vote [no. N/A](#).<sup>5</sup>**

H.R.277 would dramatically revise agency rule implementation, requiring affirmative approval by both chambers of Congress of 'major rules' within 70 days before they could go into effect. H.R.277 would hamper agencies' regulatory powers, create dangerous new opportunities for industry lobbying, and tilt the playing field dramatically

against regulation needed to protect the public interest in areas from finance to housing to climate and more.

*Introduced by Rep. Kat Cammack (R-FL-3), H.R.277 was passed by the House Judiciary Committee on May 24, 2023 by a vote of 13-5. The bill passed the House of Representatives on June 14, 2023 by a vote of 221-211.*

- **To require covered agencies to issue strategy and implementation plans for the transfer of credit, guarantee, and insurance risk to the private sector, to require the implementation of such plans, and for other purposes.**

**[H.R.9040](#). Committee vote [no. 6](#).**

H.R. 9040 requires federal agencies to shift all credit and guarantee risks to the private sector, giving Wall Street greater control over key federal programs like home mortgages, small business and farm loans, and disaster relief. This could raise costs for taxpayers and make credit less accessible or more expensive for families, farmers, and small businesses.

- **Comment Integrity and Management Act of 2024. [H.R.7528](#). Committee vote [no. 4](#).**

*Introduced by Rep. Clay Higgins (R-LA-3), H.R.7528 was approved by the Committee on Oversight and Accountability on March 7, 2024 by a vote of 31-9.*

- **Modernizing Retrospective Regulatory Review. [H.R.7533](#). Committee vote [no. 5](#).**

*Introduced by Rep. Andy Biggs (R-AZ-5), H.R.7533 was approved by the Committee on Oversight and Accountability on March 7, 2024 by a vote of 21-19.*

H.R.7528 and H.R.7533 would weaken the regulatory process by downplaying

the importance of strong safeguards and public input. Effective regulations protect consumers, workers, the environment, and public health and safety. Public participation in the rulemaking process is not only essential to democracy but an important way to ensure that individuals affected by regulations can make their voices heard about the impacts of regulations on their communities. Though these bills claim to modernize rule review and use technology to assess public comments, they ultimately discourage public involvement and expand regulatory reviews in ways that do not strengthen protections for the public.

## 8. Senate Confirmations

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This section covers Senate confirmations of President Biden’s nominations of financial regulatory leaders with strong qualifications and commitments to economic and racial justice.

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- **Confirmation of Karla Ann Gilbride as General Counsel of the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. [PN65](#). Senate vote [no. 259](#).**

Ms. Gilbride is a seasoned litigator, with 15 years of advocacy experience concerning equal opportunity under the law. She has represented workers from various backgrounds and industries at every level of the federal judiciary, safeguarding the enforcement of vital

rights and protections under anti-discrimination legislation. Ms. Gilbride has been a champion for disability rights, overtime wage protections, and anti-sexual harassment/misconduct work policies.

### III. Voting Summaries

The voting charts below cover a total 75 votes taken on 60 legislative measures—42 bills, 12 joint resolutions, 5 amendments, and one nomination—by members of the 118th Congress from January 2023 to January 2025. The total votes include 19 on the House floor; five on the Senate floor; 40 in the House Financial Services Committee; five in the House Committee on Education and the Workforce; two in the House Committee on the Judiciary; three in the House Committee on Oversight and Accountability; and one in the House Committee on Ways and Means. All but two of the votes (one on a bill and another on the confirmation of the President’s nominee to serve as General Counsel of the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission) were on legislative measures to deregulate finance and advance the interests of Wall Street insiders at the expense of the public interest.

The votes included in this report are on legislative measures—i.e., bills, joint resolutions, amendments—and nominations with a recorded vote and on which Americans for Financial Reform (AFR) took a position by either endorsing/opposing the proposal or the confirmation of a nominee through a public statement or a letter of support/opposition, or by communicating its position directly to members of Congress or their staff.

#### 1. House of Representatives

Nineteen bills opposed by AFR due to their deregulatory nature came up for a House floor vote during the 118th Congress. All of these bills advanced and most of them along party lines.

The 222 members listed in **Table 1**—all Republicans—voted on the House to advance the bills opposed by AFR in at least 90 percent

of their votes cast. That total includes 112 members who voted to advance all nineteen bills and another 64 members who voted to advance the deregulatory measures every time they voted but missed one or more votes.

Most often voting along AFR positions, the 185 members—all Democrats—listed in **Table 2** voted to oppose the bills in at least 85 percent of their votes cast. This total includes seven members who voted against all 19 measures and another 23 who voted to reject the deregulatory bills in every instance where they cast a vote but missed one or more votes. The remaining 155 members from Table 2 voted to advance one or two of the bills.

Only two Democrats, listed in **Table 3**, voted with AFR in fewer than 50 percent of their votes cast on the selected measures. Rep. Henry Cuellar (TX-28) and Rep. Jared Golden (ME-2) voted to advance 22 and 10 bills, respectively.

#### 2. House Financial Services Committee

The partisan split in this Congress was also reflected at the Committee level. **Table 5** summarizes how members of the House Financial Services Committee (HFSC) voted on the legislative measures considered by the Committee and included in this report.

In this Committee, 25 out of 29 Republicans voted in line with AFR positions in only one of the 40 bills selected. That was an AFR-endorsed bill that passed unanimously (see H.R.4116 above). Only three Republicans voted—one time each—to reject any of the deregulatory bills opposed by AFR.

On the other side of the aisle, nine Democrats voted to stop at least 35 out of the 40 legislative measures, with two representatives—Rep. Ayanna Pressley (MA-7) and Rep. Rashida Tlaib (MI-12)—voting against 38 and 37 of the measures, respectively. It is worth noting Committee Ranking Member Maxine

Waters’ sustained leadership in defense of financial regulation in the public interest throughout the 118th Congress.

### 3. Senate

This report covers five Senate votes, including the confirmation of Karla Gilbride as General Counsel of the U.S. Equal Employment Opportunity Commission. AFR supported her nomination for her strong worker and consumer protection qualifications. She was confirmed mostly along party lines, with Sen. Susan Collins (R-ME) joining all present Democrats and Independents in favor.

The other Senate votes were on joint resolutions to overturn regulatory agency rules using the Congressional Review Act (CRA). One of the joint resolutions sought to repeal a Consumer Financial Protection Bureau rule (the “CFPB rule”) to promote transparency in credit access and combat racial and gender discrimination in small business lending. Another joint resolution sought to overturn a Department of Labor rule (the “DOL rule”) to remove burdensome barriers to considering environmental, social and governance factors in plan investments and when exercising shareholder rights. Both of these CRA challenges advanced largely along party lines, with all Republicans present and two

Democrats—Senators Jon Tester (MT) and Joe Manchin (WV)—voting to overturn the DOL rule and all Republicans present plus three Democrats—Senators Jon Tester (D-MT), Joe Manchin (D-WV), and John Hickenlooper (D-CO)—and two Independents—Senators Kyrsten Sinema (I-AZ) and Angus King (I-ME)—voting to overturn the CFPB rule. The third CRA challenge sought to rescind a Securities and Exchange Commission rule protecting everyday investors from inappropriate risks and the questionable accounting and custody practices found throughout crypto markets. This CRA passed the Senate with 11 Democrats and one Independent—Senator Sinema—joining all the Republicans present voting in favor. **Table 6** summarizes the Democrats and Independents voting for at least one of the three CRAs. President Biden vetoed all three CRA resolutions, so the three rules were not ultimately nullified by Congress.

The 44 Senators, all Republicans, listed in **Table 7** voted to advance all three CRA joint resolutions *and* against the nomination covered in this report. Senators Susan Collins (R-ME) and John Tester (D-MT) voted for all the joint resolutions of disapproval but voted to confirm the nomination of Ms. Gilbride.
